Families, use this to prompt conversations at the table, in the car, and anywhere else your family experiences life together.

- How did the Egyptians and Israelites see God's power in the His big story?
- Name one of the 10 plagues. What do you think it would have been like to have lived through that plague?
- How was Pharaoh's power different from God's power?
- In what part of your life would you like to see God's power?



In this week's Bible story, God showed His power by sending 10 plagues. Ten times everyone living in Egypt—the Pharaoh, the Egyptians, and the Israelites—witnessed that God is more powerful than any man, woman, or false god. This week let the series Word of Wonder remind your family that God is powerful!

Every day this week, choose a different accent or silly voice and say Jeremiah 32:17 in it together ... 10 times!



Review the story of God freeing His people from Egypt by recreating the first nine plagues using play dough. They are river to blood, frogs, gnats, flies, livestock disease, boils, hail, locusts, and darkness.

Add some fun by making homemade play dough using this recipe: Whisk together $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ cups salt, and 2 tablespoons cream of tartar. Add $\frac{1}{4}$ cup vegetable oil and $2\frac{1}{4}$ cups boiling water. Mix well. Once cool, knead the dough until smooth. Invite your child to knead the dough. After the dough reaches the desired texture, consider mixing in food coloring.

Divide the dough into nine sections. Invite each family member to make a plague and ask them how it showed God's power. Finish by praying together and thanking God for showing His power then and now.

NOTE: The tenth plague (death of the firstborn) was especially difficult and is best not to recreate with play dough. However, if your kids are curious about it, talk about it together, pointing to both God's power and His love.
